#### From the Office of the President **Michael Earsing**

Jesuit is about the formation of the student as a whole person. We consistently talk about the six attributes of our Profile. As professional adults, we believe that we, too, should strive to model this wellroundedness. Certainly, our proclivities come out in the form of Science teachers gravitating towards discussions on science, Social Studies teachers being inclined to talk politics, Coaches talking about the sport they love, etc. We are not always perfect, but we strive to model that our educators are more than just a particular discipline.

To exemplify my assertion, one of our coaches recently referred me to an article about Theodore Roosevelt. The article was called Thirteen Readina Tips from Theodore Roosevelt. Being a bibliophile as well as an admirer of the former President meant that this piece was addressed perfectly to me.

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#### From the Desk of the Principal Tom Garrison

What is your mission? What is your son's mission?

I've been asking myself this question since we came back to school at the start of January. Before your sons returned, our faculty and staff engaged in a day of reflection together. During that day of reflection, we were presented with several different opportunities for reflection and conversation. One of those opportunities in our morning session was the opportunity to watch a movie from 1986, The Mission, and then discuss it.

The Mission stars Robert Di Niro, Jeremy Irons, and Liam Neeson. The movie made it to VHS sometime during my time as a

student at Jesuit, and I know I watched it at least twice during my time in high school. There were several scenes and themes that have stuck with me since then, but I had not seen the movie since I was your sons' age, and I was surprised by the emotions that I felt while watching this movie that I hadn't seen in thirty years. During the viewing in one of our classrooms earlier this month, I found myself revisiting old feelings that I'd forgotten that I had ever had, but that I now realize were part of my formation into whatever it is that I have become as an adult.

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## From the Parents' Executive Board Peter Scott '90, President

This is my seventh newsletter to write as Jesuit Parent Executive Board President. Every time I think about what to write, I cannot help but reminisce abut my four years at 12345 Inwood Road. Having two boys that have grown up in the same neighborhood that I grew up in and attending Jesuit some thirty years later, I am very pleased to observe some of the same patterns that I experienced some three decades ago. As they now make their way through the hallowed halls and beyond, I am experiencing my version of history repeating.

In 1986, I was a skinny, long haired kid that, despite my moderate acne, thought I was pretty cool. My initial decision to attend Jesuit was, honestly, more to please my mother than to challenge myself academically or intellectually. I didn't like the fact that I would have to wear a coat & tie, the fact that I would have to keep my hair cut reasonably short, or the fact that there were going to be no girls to meet or talk to at school. I showed up as a freshman barely knowing anyone else that would be a part of my class, the class of 1990. As was the case for almost all four of my first semesters, I was fully ready and prepared to quit Jesuit and return to Lake Highlands and all of my public-school friends. However, to my surprise, slowly, a funny thing started to happen. discovered there were a lot of boys just like me. I started to make friends with people I didn't know (several of which are life-long friends to this day). I started to not mind the coat and tie and appreciate the fact that there were no girls around. I genuinely started to like taking classes that challenged me as opposed to wanting the easiest blow-off classes. I started to crave teachers that forced me to think for No longer did I try to just memorize answers that I thought teachers wanted to hear. I looked forward to the weekly prayer services that enriched my young life in so many ways. By the time I was a Junior and especially a Senior, I was fully indoctrinated and completely on board with everything Jesuit.

Fast forward thirty years. I was very hopeful that my sons would want and get to have the same experience that I had with the class of 1990. Not surprisingly I was met with some of the exact same reservations that I myself had thirty years prior. As with me, some gentle parental persuasion intervened, and both were convinced to at least give JCP a shot. Luckily, I have seen almost the exact same progression and transformations in them. Both my boys entered as unsure and lacking conviction about their choice. Both have shown immense growth as I knew they would. I couldn't be more pleased with the outcome, both mine and theirs, in the faith filled decisions to become part of the brotherhood of Men for Others.

We have all witnessed these transformative powers over our boys' time at Jesuit and we should all be thankful to the outstanding faculty, staff and parent volunteers. Rest assured that none of the molding of your young men that takes place happens by accident. As a parent and certainly as a student I certainly took a lot of things about the school for granted. Before having access to some of the behind the scenes details, I had no idea of the careful consideration that goes into daily decisions with our boys' development in mind. The faculty, staff, and countless volunteers aren't thanked or recognized nearly enough for all that they contribute. Without them the entire experience would not be the same. We are all very blessed to get to have our sons be a part of it.



## From the Desk of the Assistant Principal of Academics Molly O'Sullivan

It is hard to believe the second semester is already underway. Fall Semester report cards are available on RangerNet and the honor roll listings are available on the website. The Report Cards on RangerNet reflect the most accurate records but please encourage your son to reach out to me if there are any issues. Congratulations to all students for their first semester achievements, especially those earning distinctions on the Honor Roll and Principal's Honor Roll.

#### **Reflecting on the Fall Semester**

As we move into the second semester, I encourage you to spend time with your son reflecting on his fall semester. You might use the following questions as a framework:

- Where did you find success during the semester? Where did you struggle?
- Which goals did you meet during the fall semester? Which goals were not met and why?
- Where were you most challenged to step outside of your comfort zone during the fall semester?
- How did your understandings of the world change over the course of the last five months?
- How have your goals changed for the spring semester?
- What resources do you need to engage during the spring to meet all of your goals? What steps do you need to take to make sure the resources are in place?
- What are you most looking forward to during the spring semester?
- What do you need from me (parent)?

In addition to listening to his responses, share your own answers and perceptions with him. Let him answer all of them first, but let him know what you have (and haven't) seen in his development. He will appreciate it. If needed, remind him to meet with teachers and counselors, visit the math lab, and take advantage of other available resources.

#### **Looking Ahead to the Spring Semester**

Jesuit is blessed with being able to provide your sons with many options throughout his academic and personal formation that afford him the opportunity to try something new and explore new talents. During this first semester at Jesuit, I have had the opportunity to talk to students about global, academic, cultural, and social justice immersion trips as well as the opportunities they have experienced through their courses here on campus. To that point, students are beginning the process of researching and requesting courses for the summer and next year. After reflecting on the fall semester with your son you should both be able to better identify the areas of interest you want to address through course selection.

Freshmen, Sophomores and Juniors met in their guidance session on January 28 to talk with administrators and counselors about the options available and selection process. I encourage you to find time and talk with your son about his perception of where he stands and how he envisions his goals for summer, next year, and his remaining time at Jesuit. Recent guidance sessions have helped students look at their progress thus far and upcoming classes in relation to their goals for college. The 2019-2020 Course Catalog is available on the website and clearly provides the prerequisites for electives and advanced courses.

As you talk to your son about his course selections, please help him think through the following factors: the family schedule, including transportation and outside commitments; mental, spiritual, and physical health; the balance of rigor and time; formation, especially of the values outlined in the Jesuit grad-at-grad profile; his goals, both short-term and long-term; and his potential. He should be seeking a course-load that challenges him while allowing him to maintain balanced relationships and emotional health. Such a course load should allow him to experience enjoyment, success, and confidence. Guidance counselors are an excellent resource to assist with the planning.

## From the Desk of the Assistant Principal of Student Affairs

On March 4, the Spring Ignatian Day will open online. This Ignatian Day continues the themes from our Fall Ignatian Day as we move from the experience of love of self to love for others. The goal of Ignatian Days is to give families an experience of elements of Ignatian Spirituality linked to their everyday lives, which undergirds the mission of the school. Through these days, families are invited to reflect on certain concepts of Ignatian Spirituality alongside the testimonies of faculty and students who have been inspired by these elements in their own lives. In addition, the students bring the conversations of the Ignatian Days back into their Theology classrooms. As a school, we round out the Ignatian Day experience with a school-wide prayer service focused on the theme. Students are encouraged in the prayer service to deepen their own reflections and make specific goals or action plans to apply what they have learned.

The off-campus Ignatian Days this year take their inspiration from the tenet of the Profile of the Jesuit Grad at Graduation: Loving. In the 2019-2020 Student Handbook, this tenant is described in the following way: "At graduation, the Jesuit student, well on the way to establishing his own identity, has also begun to move beyond self-interest and self-centeredness in human relationships...He has experienced being loved and cared for by others and being a part of the Jesuit

school community. These experiences have led him to go outside of himself and to find real happiness and joy in the love, friendship, and companionship of other people" (p. 11). Last semester, you and your son were invited to reflect together on care or love of oneself, expressed through the Ignatian term *cura personalis*, care for the whole person. As you may recall, we invited families to explore the ways in which each individual cares for oneself, how they experience love in their life, and areas where they may need to grow in how they care for themselves.

In preparation for the next Ignatian Day in March, we ask that you take some time to reflect on your Fall experience so that you might build on those conversations. Some questions you can ask in conversation with your son and family members are: What was that experience like? Were there any clear benefits that we noticed in the weeks or months that followed? What promise or commitments did we make at the end of the activities? Were we able to follow through with our action plans, or did other things come up that required our attention? say that it is a story about Jesuit priests founding missions in South America in the mid-seventeen hundreds. Their initial mission is to convert the native Guarini tribes to Christianity; or, in the words of Saint Ignatius, 'save souls.' Their mission eventually evolves into an attempt to save them from enslavement by the Portuguese, who acquired the land that the missions occupy during the Treaty of Madrid in 1750.

The effect that the movie had on me when I was a student was profound. I was taken by both Jeremy Irons' and Robert Di Niro's characters, and I wondered if I could ever be as brave as they were, as committed to something as they were. I wondered if I might have a calling to a vocation as a priest or some other form of religious life. It was a question that stayed with me for years after I graduated and, now as I look back, I guess I'm not surprised by the trajectory that my life has taken.

To be sure, these thoughts did not come only from the movie; but being exposed to that movie at that age, along with my Jesuit education, my parents' influence, and myriad other factors have brought me to where I am today. I am so grateful to work in a place where I can do something that I love, with people I love, in a school that I love.


And it's made me wonder about your sons. Where is our influence, yours, the school's and everything else that they are encountering right now in their lives taking them? It's not a question that we can answer right now, but it is one that we should be actively aware of and thinking of. Our sons are engaged in activities right now that are shaping who they will be for the rest of their lives, and we should always keep that in the center of our thoughts about them. I know you know this. Right now, it is your mission.

A mission can be a lot of different things. A mission can be a place, such as a settlement built around a church in 1750. It can be a short-lived task with a known beginning and a desired end point; it is the steps along the way that realize that end point. It can also be something so much larger; it can be our reason for getting up every day and the direction in which we choose to go for the rest of our lives.

Father Pedro Arrupe says it so much better than I ever could in his 'Fall in Love' Prayer:

"Nothing is more practical than finding God, than falling in Love in a quite absolute, final way. What you are in love with, what seizes your imagination, will affect everything. It will decide what will get you out of bed in the morning, what you do with your evenings, how you spend your weekends, what you read, whom you know, what breaks your heart, and what amazes you with joy and gratitude. Fall in love, stay in love, and it will decide everything."

My prayer for your son as we start the spring semester is that he finds this thing that he loves. When he finds that, he will also have found his mission.

Happy New Year! For the last three years, I have started the new year with a word to guide my year. This year my word is "grace." I came across this word over the break, and it just FORMING MEN OF GOD felt right to start this year recognizing God's grace more

in the people and events around me. The personal prayer of St. Ignatius of Loyola ends with a line that highlights how important recognizing and asking for grace was to his life: "Everything is yours; do with it what you will. Give me only your love and your grace, that is enough for me." As we begin this year together, I invite you to pause and recognize moments of grace in your own life and in the lives of your sons.

Grace surrounded the preparation of our January prayer services this year. A team of juniors and seniors thoughtfully and prayerfully considered what their brothers needed to hear as they started a new semester. They focused on the themes of loneliness and togetherness. The first prayer service they planned centered around the idea that everyone feels alone at some point in their lives. Speakers shared their own experiences with loneliness and did an excellent job of showing how, through their own lives and with God's help, they were able to combat the loneliness they encountered. The second prayer service came right after the global Week of Christian Unity in Christian churches. Thinking about this theme of unity, the students invited individuals to speak about how unity is essential using examples of sports, music, and building robots. I am so proud of the thoughtfulness with which these young men considered these important topics and created something beautiful for their brothers.

Grace also surrounded the preparation of our first Kairos retreat for the Spring. As I am writing this newsletter, the students are well into day two, and I can already feel God's presence moving at Montserrat in and through them. We have four more Kairos retreats this semester, one of which is our Junior Kairos where members of the class of 2021 will start to prepare to lead their brothers in retreat their senior year. Over 45 juniors are already preparing their

minds and hearts for this experience coming up in March.

As I look toward the rest of the semester, I am excited for what the future holds as I continue to notice grace moving in and through your sons. The Campus Ministry homeroom has plans to share their faith experiences with both freshmen and sophomores in guidance later this Spring. Campus Ministry will also be partnering with the art classes to produce original images of the Stations of the Cross for Lent. Our third annual Father/Son Lenten Day of Reflection will occur on March 29 - a couple weeks before Holy Week, and the Faculty/Staff Lenten blog will post every day from Ash Wednesday through Easter Sunday. In so many ways and through so many mediums, the members of the Jesuit Dallas community will be sharing their faith with one another this Spring. How can you share your faith with your sons?

#### **Family Suggestions:**

St. Ignatius invites us to start our prayer, every time we pray, asking God for a "grace." This entails asking God up front for something you need from God at this moment - what do you most desire from God right now? Maybe you need more patience with your sons or yourself. Maybe you need more courage to make a big decision. Whatever it is, Ignatius says ask God for it. God wants to know what you need. His admonition was not to force yourself to read what you do not like. (I'm sure that he actually read many things out of necessity that he did not necessarily enjoy.) He also believed that we should take book recommendations with a grain of salt, proportionally valued as well, as the recommender knows us intimately.

I found Mr. Roosevelt to have an accurate knowledge of human nature when he recommended that we train ourselves to enjoy the classics and focus on books of permanent value, however difficult, rather than succumb unaware to a diet of trashy, viscous or worthless stuff. Roosevelt makes the point that books are almost as individual as friends and similarly can have a great impact on the development of our moral character.

Roosevelt recommends that a person find a little time each day to read and use vacations to enjoy heavy books when one would have the time. He found reading a great respite from the pressures of life.

A person's mood should dictate what he reads and should be interesting to the particular reader at that particular time. Roosevelt felt it was not a problem to lay a book aside if you are not in the right mood for that particular read.

Theodore did not believe in the value of limiting yourself to some pundit's list of the hundred best books or the recommended five- foot library. Rather, a reading list should be one that changes and adapts to your needs as you go through your life.

By the way, there is an art exhibit on campus in the Historical Library. *Historic American Pop*, January through the middle of March. The artist is Laura Roosevelt, the great-granddaughter of Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt.

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## Community Service & Social Justice Richard Perry

#### **Urban Plunge -**

Applications Open Online January 31

The Dallas Urban Plunge experience is a daily leadership service and justice program being offered this summer (June 17-20 for rising sophomores; August 3-7 for rising juniors). Using a combination of direct service and guided reflection, it provides a unique opportunity to experience social injustice in our own city. Students are given an opportunity to make a direct impact at several different organizations and agencies that serve as some of our most important community partners. organizations include Catholic Charities, Resource Center of Dallas, elder care facilities, Austin Street Center, Incarnation House, and others. At the conclusion of each day students have the opportunity to reflect and pray with their fellow classmates while discussing ways that they can work to improve the lives of the poor, vulnerable, and marginalized in our community. Rising sophomores and juniors can complete the program to satisfy their grade level service and justice experience requirement. Throughout the week, students will engage with the themes of Catholic Social Teaching through reflection, prayer, and discussion. Each day, we will prepare, serve, and enjoy a meal and/or fellowship time with a variety of marginalized populations in the city, while making new friends and better understanding the challenges that are faced by many of our neighbors. In order to complete the grade level requirement, students must:

- Commit to the entire program for their specific grade level (note that rising sophomores program includes three half days in afternoon that do not interfere with summer school, as well as one full day on Saturday. Please note that rising juniors program is Monday to Friday, approximately 8 hours per a day
- For rising sophomores, participation in the program will also require several follow-up lunch meetings to discuss the program themes. This will replace their social justice guidance period practicum commitment during the school year.
- Complete the journal (reflective educational piece)

Program cost is \$400. Financial aid is available.

### From the Desk of the Director of Student Formation Dr. Mark Knize

For those who were able to join us during our parent nights in January, we hope the meeting time was informative and valuable. Mr. Fitzsimmons, our director of guidance, and Mr. Shoemaker in college counseling reminded us that the college process is not unlike all other developmental experiences for our students. It is a journey.

Freshmen are called to dream, a stage of absorbing the numerous possibilities Jesuit offers to be involved. College possibilities will come to fruition in due time. For now, look for Jesuit activities and groups that meet your interests. Work diligently to focus on your coursework and grades. Review your PSAT score report to determine how best to improve. Build relationships with your teachers, coaches, and peers through academic and extracurricular involvement.

Sophomores are challenged to explore, a stage of engagement that dives deeper into extra-curricular involvement, leadership opportunities, and community service. Focus on improving PSAT by using online tools and relevant practice. Keep account of your accomplishments and think about short-term action items that augment grades, involvement, and leadership. Continue to build on academic goals and develop self-advocacy as a means to reach those goals.

Juniors are encouraged to plan. It is time to determine what classes you should take during senior year to put yourself in the best position to meet your goals. Use online tools to dive deeper into college matches, including what may or may not be affordable. Make an appointment with your counselor to generate an initial college list. Organize your schedule for important tests like the SAT and ACT.

Our students remain in varying stages of student life. Dreaming, exploring, and planning may be convoluted and overwhelming for a teenager if the process is not organized into doable chunks. It is important to focus on small pieces at a time.

Writing down concrete actions helps an adolescent from being overwhelmed by a long-term process or the abstract. Focusing on specific action items can be the key to a less stressful student life, especially as he begins to explore all the possibilities available to continue his education beyond Jesuit.

When students visit my office this time of year, I offer them the following advice:

- 1. Write down 2 goals for this semester
- 2. Write down a reasonable timeline to accomplish the goals
- 3. Write down the actions you must take to make the goals happen

It is important to schedule time for study, time for extra-curricular activities, time for family and friends, and time for self. It is most important to enjoy the moments as much as possible. As reminded during the parent nights, the counseling offices serve as great resource in helping your son navigate his goals. Thank you for the partnership.

#### **Laura Roosevelt "Historic American Pop"** January 16 – March 12, 2020

The exhibition opened on Thursday, January 16, 2020 with a great crowd and excellent talk by the artist. Laura Roosevelt, Franklin and Eleanor's great-granddaughter, specializes in abstract mixed media painting. These pieces incorporate iconic photographs of FDR, Eleanor Roosevelt, Theodore Roosevelt, and others with textured, abstract backgrounds, reshaping the experience of those moments frozen in time. The exhibit "Historic American Pop"-Α Collaborated Historical Perspective of Abstract Art and the Words of Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt" features Roosevelt's art along with Eleanor and Franklin's words, chosen by her sister Elizabeth Roosevelt Kelly and their late great-aunt Chandler Roosevelt Lindsley.

The Jesuit Dallas Museum continues to loan works to other institutions for exhibitions. Currently the

sculpture, Titer – Tooter, is included in a 100-year retrospective of the sculptor Heri Bert Bartscht (1919 – 1996) at The University of Dallas. Father J.B. Leininger commissioned Bartscht to create the Stations of the Cross for the Jesuit Chapel. These metal sculptures, constructed of welded steel with copper plate and patina, grace the chapel walls today.
